



FOREWORD



THE WEST VIRGINIA HUMAN RIGHTS ACT, AS AMENDED

(Chapter 5, Article 11, West Virginia Code)

ADMINISTERED BY

THE WEST VIRGINIA HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION

Declaration of Policy

"It is the public policy of the State of West Virginia to provide all of its citizens equal opportunity for employment, equal access to places of public accommodations, and equal opportunity in the sale, purchase, lease, rental and financing of housing accommodations or real property. Equal opportunity in the areas of employment and public accommodations is hereby declared to be a human right or civil right of all persons without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, blindness or handicap. Equal opportunity in housing accommodations or real property is hereby declared to be a human right or civil right of all persons without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, blindness, handicap, or familial status.

The denial of these rights to properly qualified persons by reason of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, blindness, handicap, or familial status is contrary to the principles of freedom and equality of opportunity and is destructive to a free and democratic society." (Section 5-11-2)

COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION

The West Virginia Human Rights Act requires that the Governor appoint, with the advice and consent of the Senate, nine citizens of the State to sit as commissioners. These individuals represent a broad spectrum of West Virginia's racial, religious, and ethnic groups. No more than five commissioners may belong to the same political party. At least one, but no more than three members, shall represent each congressional district.

The commissioner's terms last three years, beginning the first day of July of the year they are appointed. However, appointments made to fill vacancies are for the unexpired term thereof. Members can be reappointed. Each member takes and subscribes to the official oath dictated by Section 5, Article IV, of the West Virginia Constitution before undertaking their duties as commissioners.

Commissioners are paid \$25 per day for time actually spent performing their duties. They are also reimbursed for expenses necessary for the performance of their duties. They do not receive an annual salary.

The Commission elects a chairperson and a vice-chairperson soon after the beginning of each fiscal year. Furthermore, the Governor appoints an executive director by and with the Senate's advice and consent. This executive director acts as the Commission's secretary. He/she should be particularly qualified for the position and receive a yearly salary. The executive director oversees daily operations of the agency.

Officers, departments, and agencies of the State Government may be requested for assistance in hearings, programs, and projects by the Commission. The State Attorney General must render legal services to the Commission if requested. The Civil Rights Division of the Attorney General's Office has been a great help in diminishing the Commission's backlog of cases for public hearing.

POWERS, FUNCTIONS, AND SERVICES

The West Virginia Human Rights Commission is responsible for the enforcement of the West Virginia Human Rights Act, as amended. Through cooperation with both the public and private sectors, the Commission seeks to bring about mutual understanding and respect among all racial, religious, and ethnic groups within the State.

The Commission is empowered to receive, investigate, and adjudicate complaints alleging discrimination because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age (40 years and over), blindness, or handicap. It is unlawful to discriminate against an individual for the aforementioned reasons in the areas of employment, public accommodations, housing accommodations, and/or real property.

The West Virginia Human Rights Act authorizes the Commission to issue subpoena and/or subpoenas duces tecum, hold hearings, and take testimony. The Commission may enter cease and desist orders and apply to the appropriate court of competent jurisdiction for enforcement of Commission orders. These enforcement powers have been granted by the Legislature to ensure that all West Virginians are guaranteed equal protection under the law.

Equally important, the Commission can make recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature concerning policies, procedures, practices and legislation concerning matters influencing human rights. The Commission may also create agencies or councils which study discrimination wherever necessary, in order to encourage goodwill, cooperation, and conciliation among the State's people. Then, reports of such studies may be released. Furthermore, a written report is prepared annually, with copies submitted to the Governor, which summarizes the Commission's progress.

On the whole, the West Virginia Human Rights Commission has sought to maintain and further its goals and purposes. Through investigating complaints, it has sought to assert citizens' rights for equality under the Human Rights Act. Also, the Commission has actively participated in events and organizations which further understanding, cooperation, and harmony among the people in West Virginia.

EDUCATIONAL OVERVIEW

One of the West Virginia Human Rights Commission's responsibilities has been to provide educational support to individuals, groups, and organizations. Throughout the past three years the Commission's staff has strived to fulfill its educational duties despite the dissolution of its Educational Division. Various staff members have spoken to assemblies, participated in organizational activities, as well as consulted businesses and organizations.

For example, staff members have addressed classes at West Virginia State College, West Virginia College of Graduate Studies, and West Virginia Institute of Technology. They have also spoken to the Kanawha Valley Board of Realtors, Blue Cross/Blue Shield Insurance Company,, and the Region III Fair Housing Agencies. Major topics of interest have been age and maternity discrimination, non-discriminatory employment procedures, discrimination theories, and subtle forms of discrimination.

Besides speaking engagements, the West Virginia Human Rights Commission has been affiliated with organizations and activities whose goals and themes have been similar to its own. For example, the Commission is represented by one of its staff members on the West Virginia Advocates for the Mentally Disabled (WVAMD). Specifically, the WVAMD serves to insure that eligible individuals are not denied access to programs offered by the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation. Equally important, the Commission was one of thirty organizations which helped form and support Citizens for Passage of Unlawful Paramilitary Act (CPUPA). CPUPA proposed and fought to have legislation passed preventing violent expression of prejudice. On March 26, 1989, a bill was passed in the West Virginia Legislature forbidding plots and training aimed at causing property damage, physical injury, and murder due to prejudice. Moreover, the West Virginia Human Rights Commission has actively participated in events such as Civil Rights Day 1989 and the Black Leadership Symposium.

Finally, the Commission has advised various firms and organizations on laws concerning discrimination. For example, the West Virginia Human Rights Commission, in conjunction with the Office of the Attorney General, consulted the West Virginia Association of Realtors. This project dealt with preventing discrimination practices through proper hiring procedures as well as keeping accurate records as a defensive measure.

In conclusion, education is a great tool which must be used continuously and actively in order to achieve desired results. Unfortunately, a mind can be taught bigotry just as it can be taught fair-mindedness. Therefore, the West Virginia Human Rights Commission must persistently pursue its efforts to promote cooperation and understanding among all people.

CASE PROCESSING PROCEDURES

Introduction

If for any reason, an individual feels discriminated against, they should contact the West Virginia Human Rights Commission. Once contacted, the Commission initiates its complaint procedures.

Compliance Division Activities

First, a complaint must be filed within 180 days after a discriminatory incident has occurred. Otherwise, the complaint can no longer be considered timely and thus unable to be pursued. Yet, if the complaint is timely and the Commission has jurisdiction, an intake officer sends a complainant a background information form which must be completed and returned. This form helps depict a more detailed account of the potential discriminatory act and enables the Commission to establish jurisdiction. Once returned, a formal complaint is written by the intake officer. Then, it is sent to the complainant to be reviewed, signed, notarized, and returned. Subsequently, any noted corrections are made, and the complaint is sent to the docket clerk. The clerk docket the complaint and assigns it to an investigator.

After receiving an assignment, an investigator seeks any additional information from the complainant. Also, he/she sends the respondent a questionnaire and requests a position statement, as well as documentation such as payroll records, time cards, medical records, personnel files, and etc. If the respondent does not cooperate, then the Commission can subpoena the respondent for what is needed. Afterwards, the complainant is notified of the respondent's position and is asked for his/her response. They are also asked to name any witnesses that could support their respective cases.

Eventually, an investigator sends exit-interview letters to the complainant and the respondent requesting any more pertinent information before ending the investigation. Both parties have five days to respond. Subsequently, a case recommendation is written. It summarizes the case investigation, citing specific details which can lead to the conclusion of whether or not there is probable cause to believe discrimination has occurred. Then, the case recommendation is reviewed by the Assistant Compliance Director who inspects its logical and chronological order. Upon approval, the recommendation is directed to the Compliance Director's attention. The Compliance Director reviews every case and has four options. The investigator's recommendation can be approved, disapproved, changed, or returned for additional information/investigation.

If the Compliance Director approves an investigator's recommendation of No Probable Cause, then the complainant is notified of the findings and their right to appeal within ten days. However, if Probable Cause is found, then the case is sent to public hearing.

CASE PROCESSING PROCEDURES
(Continued)

Legal Division Activities

Once a case is received in the Legal Division, it is noticed for public hearing and assigned a hearing examiner; then, both parties are notified. The complainant, respondent, their respective attorneys, a hearing examiner, witnesses, and a court reporter are present at the actual hearing. After introductions, motions, and opening statements, testimonies are given. Next, the examiner can ask questions. Afterwards, closing statements or comments are allowed. Upon the termination of the hearing, both the complainant and respondent must submit their proposed findings based only on facts brought out in the hearing. At length, the examiner submits his/her recommended decision to the Commission members for a final decision. The Commission can modify, reject, overturn, or accept the examiner's recommended decision. They can also require another hearing to be conducted. Once a decision is reached, both the complainant and respondent are notified of the final orders. Once notified, the losing party has ten days to ask the Commission for a reconsideration. If a motion is received for reconsideration, the Commission can deny or accept it. Upon deciding, the Commission reissues its final orders. The loser then has thirty days to appeal directly to the West Virginia State Supreme Court of Appeals.

Nonetheless, conciliation may occur any time before a final decision is made. The Compliance Director acts as a negotiator between the complainant and the respondent. If an offer is agreed upon, then the conciliation is documented and signed by the complainant, the respondent, and the Compliance Director. Thereafter, the agreement is legally binding. Compliance to the conciliation can be judicially enforced.

NEW REGULATIONS

On April 8, 1989, the West Virginia Legislature enacted amendments to Sections two, four, eight, nine, and eleven, Article Eleven, Chapter Five of the West Virginia Code to be effective July 1, 1989. These amendments relate:

. . .to the human rights commission; policy; powers; objects; functions; services; definitions; adding discrimination on the grounds of familial status as an unlawful discriminatory practice; exemption; complaints; subpoena and subpoena duces tecum; hearings; delegation of authority to hearing examiners; commission review of hearing examiner's final decision; conciliation agreements; unlawful discriminatory practices generally; and appeal and enforcement of commission orders.

First, familial status was included in the declaration of public policy as a condition protected from discrimination. Familial status was then defined (in 5-11-3, subsection u) as individual(s) under age 18 living with a legal guardian or a designee of such guardian. Furthermore, anyone pregnant or securing legal custody of a minor is also included in the familial status definitions. This means they, too, are protected. However, nothing in this definition pertains to housing/dwellings for older persons.

Secondly, the definition of "handicap" was expanded greatly. The definition explained that major life activities limited by a handicap would be "functions such as caring for one's self, performing manual tasks, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning, and working." Moreover, a record of any such impairment constitutes a handicap. Also, a person thought to have such an impairment would be protected too. On the other hand, any person using or addicted to drugs or alcohol which inhibits their job performance is considered a threat to persons and property and therefore not subject to this section.

The changes in the Commission's powers, functions, and services were significant. First, the location of public hearing is to be held where the respondent resides/transacts business, where both parties agree, or where the alleged incident occurred. Second, the subpoena power is subject to approval by either the Executive Director or the Commission's chairperson, instead of the agreement of at least five Commission members. Thirdly, the hearing examiner decides all questions of fact and law presented at hearing and then makes a final decision. This decision is liable for review by the Commission. Then any appeals are made to the Commission within thirty days of the examiner's final decision. Specific criteria are used for judging appeals. They are whether or not the examiner's decision:

1. Conforms to West Virginia and United States law and constitution;
2. Is within the jurisdiction and authority of the Commission;
3. Followed proper procedures required by law or rules of the Commission; and,
4. Is substantially supported by evidence; is not arbitrary, capricious, or characterized by abuse of discretion or clearly unwarranted exercise of discretion.

NEW REGULATIONS
(CONTINUED)

Next, any conciliation agreements require the respondent to cease discriminatory practices and to abide by the terms of the conciliation. Terms of a conciliation are first agreed upon between the respondent and the Commission. Then, these terms are sent to the complainant who either agrees or objects to them. If he/she agrees with or fails to respond to the Commission within fifteen days, then the Commission makes the terms effective and gives notice to both parties. If no further objections are made, the conciliation becomes enforceable. Otherwise, the case goes to public hearing.

Besides changes in powers and functions, the specifications of discriminatory practices are somewhat different. This difference is due to the addition of familial status. Persons may not be refused sale, rent, lease, furnishings, assignment, or sublease of any housing accommodations due to familial status. Also included are withholding, extending, modifying, renewing, or fixing rates, terms, conditions, or financial provisions.

Finally, the appeal and enforcement of the Commission's orders has also been amended. Appellants may now appeal to the Kanawha County Circuit Court if the Commission awards damages other than back pay exceeding five thousand dollars or the Commission awards back pay exceeding thirty thousand dollars, or if both parties agree to appeal to the circuit court. The party aggrieved by the decision of the circuit court may appeal the decision to the WV Supreme Court of Appeals. Such an appeal must be made within thirty days of the notification of the circuit court's decision.

In conclusion, these amendments became effective July 1, 1989. They were designed to streamline case processing and to benefit the execution of justice for ALL!
